daily life. The Welcoming Prayer is used when your needs for security, affection, and control are frustrated or gratified and cause emotional reactions. It is a way of turning everything over to God by using these three simple movements:

- Focus and sink into the bodily sensation. Do not resist it, simply experience the sensation.
- 2. Welcome. Remain in the bodily sensation and gently say to the world *Welcome* silently, embracing the Holy Spirit in and through the bodily sensation.
- 3. Let go. While continuing to experience and rest in the body sensation, repeat the letting go sentences as you open to the healing act of grace within:

"I let go of my desire for security."

"I let go of my desire for affection."

"I let go of my desire for control."

"I let go of my desire to change the situation."

Letting go means passing through the experience, not around it, not running away from it, or stuffing

Dignity aside, it was then time to party for the next week, Whitsuntide, a spring festival just like the old days. There would be parades, fairs, lots of ale, and Morris Dancing. The holiday still lives on in England and Ireland now known a the Spring Bank Holiday minus the Morris Dancing! We are now at Whit's end!

Whits' Beginning

May 31, 2020 is the birthday of the Church, a celebration that goes by a name coined from the word for fifty in an ancient language. Pentecost is Greek for fiftieth and the name given to the Jewish festival of Shauvot (Festival of Weeks or Harvest Festival). So, how do we have a significant Christian event celebrated on a Jewish festival with a Greek name?

Curious you should ask?

I direct attention to the Christian and Hebrew calendars which this year coincide within a day, this year Passover began at sundown on Wednesday April 8th with the Seder meal. The next day, Thursday the 9th, the Christian Church except for the Orthodox celebrate Maundy Thursday, the night when Jesus held a Seder and instituted the sacrament of Holy Communion. According to the Hebrew tradition seven weeks plus one day (7x7=49+1=50) after Passover the first fruits harvest was celebrated. The grain planted around the time of Passover was now fully grown and ripe for harvesting. Later commemorations also including the giving of The Law to Moses on Mount Sinai.

It should not seem surprising that this would be the time for The Holy Spirit to make a dramatic appearance to those gathered together as tongues of fire and giving speech in languages those present understood. The seed having died and been planted by Christ in the disciples was now mature enough for the Holy Spirit to harvest as the beginning of the Church. These would be the ones to go out into the world for the planting of new seed and amore abundant harvest of believers. This brings me to the answer for a question that was asked during one 10AM Bible study. What's Whitsunday? Answer: Pentecost! Why call it Whitsunday?

NAMING GRIEF

David Kessler, author of Finding Meaning: The Sixth Stage of Grief, says that many people are experiencing a number of kinds of grief during the pandemic. Anticipatory grief imagines the worst about the future; focusing on present realities is the antidote. People are grieving over loss of normalcy, connections, and economic security. Collective grief is in the air. Think about how you can let go of things you can't control and stock up on compassion for others.

CLC GOALS FOR 2020

At their Leaders' Retreat, the staff, Admin Team and Congregational Council looked at the key traits of healthy and growing congregations. Working together, they chose to focus on six goals for 2020:

- 1. We work to create a safe, caring faith community. We withhold judgment, greet one another in friendship, build harmonious relationships, speak the truth in love, and warmly welcome those new to us.
- 2. Children's ministry that kids don't want to leave. Imagine kids being in an environment that allows them to understand God's love for them while being invested in by caring adults who partner with parents to disciple them.
- 3. Genuine heart for the lost and the desire to embrace the mess. Growing churches aren't just conscious of the lost, they pursue them and are ready to take on the messes of life they may bring.
- **4.** Clear outward focus. Their members intentionally know non-believers, with budget spent to start new ministries and expand services.
- 5. We have a strong core group, but also equip and invite others to serve. Long-term members open the door for new members to serve, equipping the next generation to lead the church into the future.
- **6.** Shareable Church Communication that Inspires and Informs. A church that is healthy communicates constantly.

BENEVOLENT OWNER

During the Great Depression, Milton Hershey, founder of the Hershey Chocolate Company, kept his workers employed despite declining sales. The developer of the town, Hershey, Pennsylvania, he even kept the building projects going, which employed 600 construction workers at the time.

"If I don't provide work for them, I'll have to feed them," Hershey said. "And since building materials are now at their lowest levels, I'm going to build and give them jobs."

FOOD FOR THOUGHT
