


Please support our CLC food pantry with donations of condiments this summer! FYI the Food Pantry is CLOSED for Memorial Day, Monday May 31st.

Christ and Nicodemus . . . Bring Your Questions

Although Nicodemus comes to Jesus claiming to know that Jesus comes from God, it is clear from the remainder of the conversation that he has deep questions on his heart. And after all of Jesus' talk of being born of water and Spirit Nicodemus almost pleads: "How can these things be?" (John 3:9).

What questions do you bring to worship with you today?

As we gather around the baptismal font, we do so with Luther's reminder that "daily a new person is to come forth and rise up to live before God in righteousness and purity forever" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 1165). We too might ask, "How can these things be?" Does today feel like a new day of righteousness and purity? Does today feel any different than yesterday or the day before? Sometimes the answer is yes, but often it does not seem there is anything "new" about any given day.


Throughout the gospels we hear about people's responses to their encounters with Jesus. They go away healed and rejoicing, grieving or angry. We get no such exit with Nicodemus. Jesus speaks about God's love for the world and is soon on the move again. What happened to Nicodemus? He will reappear in the seventh chapter of John, defending Jesus as the leaders wonder why Jesus has not been arrested, and in the nineteenth chapter to help lay Jesus in the tomb. In both cases today's encounter with Jesus is remembered. It seems that Nicodemus's questions and his struggle to understand are the beginning of a slow reshaping of his life.

Bring your questions to the water today. Bring your questions again and again. Dip your hands in the water; mark yourself with the cross; know that the water and the Spirit will reshape you in ways you may not understand today but will certainly remember in later chapters of life. \sim

Behold! I Tell You a Mystery

The Bible is full of mysteries, not the Dashiell Hammett, Agatha Christie, Alfred Hitchcock kind, but those of events, of people, of the how, and of the why. The answer: God did it! What other answer is there? God has his reasons and that is sufficient until we come to the mystery God's own self (I avoided himself, herself, itself, etc.). Why should we think about this? Because the Church devotes one whole Sunday to the subject, the First Sunday after Pentecost is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, God as Father, God as Son, God as Holy Spirit BUT one God with three Personifications.



Last Sunday the Confirmation class

became full members of CLC and I thought of my own. I still have the red covered paperback book and inside is a full sheet of mimeographed, old style texting, questions. Confirmation was held on Palm Sunday but the Sunday prior the six in the class sat at the front of the church facing the congregation and were questioned by the Pastor, Augustus C. Peeler, sitting in the front row. The congregation could ask questions too but they never did.

The first question on the list: Who is God? What did he do?

I'm sure there was a rote answer which I have forgotten, I don't recall if that was one of the questions that Sunday, I've never forgotten the question.

To most people when asked, who's so and so?

They usually reply with a bit of the what the person looks like, what they've done. For God we only know what he has done, for those who have seen him cannot live or only had a fleeting glimpse of his back or in a mist. We know



what He has done and that He speaks through many such as prophets. Then there a Son, Jesus, who lived on earth with us for a while, teaching and atoning for sin. Then the Spirit who is a messenger and Comforter. In all, very mysterious.

The Athanasian Creed which is occasionally recited Trinity Sunday by the Church goes to great length in some 800 to 900 words over 44 verses to explain that which cannot be explained in human terms. I rely on the explanation of the Trinity given by Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen of New York City on his weekly television show of the 50's and 60's.

"What is water? H2O, that is its nature. As a liquid it's H2O, as ice it's H2O, as steam it's H2O. Its nature does not change, only the form. Thus it is with the nature of God, the nature does not change but only the form." Thus the creeds say, 'God the Father Almighty, creator; the Son, Jesus, who took on flesh to atone for sin; the Holy Spirit proceeding from the Father and Son who works in mysterious ways!" ~
