The Lord was not in the wind, the Lord was not in the earthquake, the Lord was not in the fire. Had Elijah expected something big, something spectacular when he was told to come out of the cave and stand before the Lord? Sheer silence. It was then a voice came to him instructing him how to cleanse Israel from the worship of Baal. It's often been referred to as 'a still, small, voice'.

There is no need for a multiplicity of words, decibel levels raised to attract the attention of God or others, exhorting sermons, filling the time with the singing of hymns, though there is nothing wrong with any of these. Simon and Garfunkel sang of "The Sounds of Silence" along with "Mrs. Robinson" and the herbs that grow in the garden, but 'silence' makes an impression.

Are we afraid of silence? Look around, ear buds, phones constantly to ears, radios in cars and trunks at deafening levels, 'elevator' music everywhere. Has 'being connected' gone too far to be healthy?

Laissez Taizé Days of Summer continued

Have Christians lost the ability for quiet contemplation? There are mantras associated with yoga practices and Buddhists will sit on the carpeted floor of a temple in contemplation for long periods; but do those practices, moments of silence scare us? In monasteries and abbeys there are required times for silence, for inner reflection, for a single focus.

Wednesday, over a week ago, June 16, at 7:00, a simple time of reflection punctuated with chants developed by the Taizé religious community debuted in the sanctuary of CLC. Though not total silence the understated and quiet music repeated like a mantra imbues a calming effect as the words, that small voice, penetrate the mind. There is a short lesson and later simple prayers followed by closing songs and then silence, a reflection of the gathering in silence before the opening song. Nothing rushed, nothing hurried.

To those in attendance it was a most satisfying evening! These evenings are scheduled on Wednesdays throughout the summer. Come join us, relieve the tension of the constant noise. ~



Introduction to the day, Sunday, June 27, 2021

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two.



We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider. \sim



Robust Adapter

As technology changes, the ways we connect cables to computers and store data also change. New laptops do not have all the ports and drives that laptops made just a few years ago have. And yet, we need all those devices, old and new, to be able to "talk" to one another. Enter the adapter, which bridges two or more ways of connecting. Some adapters are robust enough to connect multiple generations of technology, facilitating connection and communication.



In today's gospel we encounter a

Jesus who is robust at adapting to the different ways people need to connect and communicate with him. First there is Jairus, who falls at Jesus' feet in a public show of desperation and boldly tells Jesus, "Come and lay your hands on [my daughter]" to heal her (Mark 5:23). Next is the woman who has been hemorrhaging for twelve years. She quietly touches Jesus' robe, hoping to go unnoticed. Then come people from Jairus's house who do not believe there is anything Jesus can do. Finally, some at Jairus's house laugh when Jesus says the daughter is only sleeping.

With each encounter Jesus is the robust adapter who meets people where they are, bringing connection, communication, and so much more. He goes with Jairus, gives the woman a voice and a blessing, puts a challenge before the doubters, and puts out the scoffers. These last two groups will certainly reflect on Jesus' words and actions toward them when they see Jairus's daughter walking about town.

What posture and pains do you bring with you today? What certainties or doubts? What questions or requests do you bring to Jesus? There is no one way to approach the font and the table. Jesus adapts to meet us right where we are, and then heals, grows, and challenges us. Through connection, communion, love, and grace he sends us out with the blessing that our faith has made us well. ~

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
