



Introduction to the day, Sunday, July 4, 2021

Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the



assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent. ~

Dependence Day

Today marks the 245th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence by the American colonies. Celebrations in the United States will mark the historical claiming of independence, but also will highlight aspects of American national identity such as individualism.

On this day when many in the United States revel in independence, we encounter a gospel story grounded entirely in dependence. Jesus does not send out disciples on their own, but rather as pairs. He orders them to take nothing with them except what they are wearing. As they travel from place to place, they will be entirely dependent on the hospitality of those they encounter for food, water, shelter, and other needs that arise along the way.

As they cast out demons and heal people, it is not through their own power, but their dependence on Jesus. Even Jesus has a touch of dependence in this story. The people of Nazareth cannot see past the little boy he was, to the powerful prophet and teacher he has become. This somehow limits the deeds of power he can accomplish among them. The expectations of the town's people seem to get in the way.

The risen Jesus certainly breaks all sorts of expectations, and Martin Luther's explanation of the third article of the creed reminds us that it is not by our own power that we come to faith, but that the Holy Spirit "calls, gathers, enlightens, and makes holy the whole Christian church" (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, p. 1162).

Our gospel for today, alongside Luther's reflection, reminds us that part of the gift of life we have in Christ is community—dependent, loving, compassionate, frustrating, messy, blessed community. We call this community the church, the body of Christ. All its members are gifted, all of them necessary, all of them dependent on one another. In this dependence is strength, joy, and hope. Thanks be to God.

Render Unto Cæsar

You may have noticed in the past that I have this thing for writing about calendars and dates so this week will be no exception.

Rarely does a national holiday fall on a Sunday since the passing of the Uniform Monday Holiday Act in 1968, taking effect in 1971, in order to give Federal employees a three day weekend. Exempted from this were: New Years Day, Independence Day, and Christmas, Veterans (Armistice) Day was returned to November 11 in 1974 when Veterans' groups pointed out the significance of the date and the time when the hostilities between the Allies and the Central Powers of WW I ceased by agreement reached at Compiègne a few hours earlier, November (11) 11, (1918) At 11:00 AM.

Independence Day, July 4, 2021, is a Sunday and we as Christians have two things to celebrate:

- . The resurrection of Jesus Christ which we do each Lord's Day, Sunday.
- The Independence of colonies from Great Britain which would later be known as the United States of America. After the Declaration was approved and sent to the printers, John Adams wrote to his wife of July 2, "... Independence Day will be celebrated by succeeding generations ... as the Day of Deliverance by solemn Acts of Devotion to God Almighty.

Jesus only references government with, "Render unto Cæsar the things that are Cæsar's, and unto God the things that are God's." St. Paul in Romans elaborates about being subject to governing authorities and encourages good citizenship while holding the Kingdom of God as the first priority.

To this point Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the new red book, has lessons and a prayer for a national holiday, one very appropriate that we should ponder this weekend.

Lord of all the worlds, guide this nation by your Spirit to go forward in justice and freedom. Give to all our people the blessings of well-being and harmony, but above all these things give us faith in you, that our nation may bring glory to your name and blessings to all peoples, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. ~
