

In today's gospel many people take offense at Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh and drink his blood; even many of Jesus' disciples peel off. This is the backdrop in John's gospel for Peter's confession of faith. "To whom can we go?" asks Peter, in words we sometimes sing just before the gospel is read. "You have the words of eternal life." In order to take such a stand, as Peter and Joshua did, Paul tells us to

arm ourselves with the word of God. We pray in the Spirit that we might be bold ambassadors of the gospel.



<u>Tradition</u> & <u>Change</u>

In thinking about this week's article I came across something I wrote in 2014 that proves just as timely today. A series of interrelated articles appeared in The Lutheran at that time concerning why things are done the way they are in the Lutheran

Church.

The Sunday after Labor Day church returns to 'normal' the choir is back, adjustments are often made to the service, now is a good time to review those articles.

"Tradition" was written by Robert C. Saler and delves into the heart of what Luther had in mind when he set about reforming the Church, not break from it. Luther was not a maverick, he was very traditional in his faith, a faith he wished to return to its roots. He did not sweep away 1500 years of tradition but affirmed what was good keeping what many other reformers considered too Catholic. He got rid of what he considered injurious to faith, shaping a church which would create its own traditions as the Holy Spirit would guide it. We are lucky as a Church body to have Luther's most important writings and other documents of faith collected in The Book of Concord, or everything you need to know to be a Lutheran.

The second article gives insight into practices abandoned long ago but returning with a certain immediacy for today. David A. Berg uses this idea as a jumping off point to show different approaches in worship can be integrated and not be at odds with each other, but the structure and integrity must be maintained whether we favor traditional or contemporary styles in our worship. It is not about our personal interests but about worshiping a God who loves us all. The author offers many examples of things which can be done to augment the perception of ritual within the church, indeed, our congregation has incorporated many of them over the years and continues to do so.

Augustine was one of the greatest theologians of the Western church. A native of North Africa, he recovered

from a debauched young adulthood through the influence of his mother, Monica, and Bishop Ambrose of

Milan. Besides writing influential theological books, he served as bishop of Hippo, in present-day Algeria.

Moses the Black, monk, martyr, died around 400

murdered when Berber bandits attacked his monastery.

Saturday, August 28, 2021

Converted from life as a thief and a robber to Christianity, Moses was an Ethiopian who became a desert monk at Skete. The change in his heart and life had a profound impact on his native country. He was


