"You always have the poor with you," Jesus told the disciple who complained about the extravagance of Mary's anointing (John 12:8). It's not a callous dismissal. In fact, he is likely quoting Deuteronomy 15:11, which continues: "I therefore command you, 'Open your hand to the poor and needy neighbor in your land.""

No one has ever lived in a world that has solved the crisis of poverty. It can be disheartening to see the same social problems we have addressed for years continuing to grow.

Throughout Jesus' life and teaching, he repeatedly offered examples of our ongoing responsibility to care for each other. "You will always have the poor with you" may feel deflating when we focus on always, but what if we put the emphasis on with? How are we with people who are poor, in diverse communities of various experiences, incomes, needs, and insights?

We live in a time and place of considerable financial instability without much room for error. One health crisis or job loss can sink us into poverty, so we need each other. Mary's extravagant generosity shows us we are not on our own. As members of the body of Christ, we are in this together. We can let generosity flow through us because God pours life into us, fragrant and overflowing, bursting with possibility.

We pray not for "my daily bread" but for "our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11), so we must be with each other, to share, to give and receive, to love and be loved. We are children of a God who, like Mary with her perfume, does not hold back but lets love flow. This love flows richly through us, through the body of Christ that gathers together and cares for each other and for others. Together we have enough. ~

Our God makes all things new. In the first reading God promises it. In the gospel Mary anticipates it, anointing Jesus' feet with costly perfume in preparation for the day of his burial. In the second reading Paul recalls his transformation from



the persecutor Saul into an apostle. In baptism, God's new person (you!) rises daily from the deadly mire of trespasses and sins.






### REGISTRATION FOR CAMP LUTHERLYN

### **CLC Food Pantry Updates**

We have received a generous grant from the SWPA Synod's Ethel L. Verney Fund! This fund was established in 2014 with a \$4 million bequest for the purpose of "relief and support of people living in poverty." More news to come on how we will use this money to serve our neighbors!

Starting mid-April, the food pantry will be open Monday and Friday mornings (9:30-11:30) and Wednesday evenings (5:00pm-7:00pm). We will also pick one Sunday afternoon a month to open the pantry and enlist volunteers after church to help with inventory, clean-up,

## Spring

"Spring is sprung, the grass is riz; gee, I wonder where the flowers is?" Many people probably remember that silly little ditty usually recited around the first day of spring. Spring arrived with the Vernal Equinox on Sunday March 20 at 11:33 AM amid snow and ice and cold temperatures, the daffodils poking their stems through the drifts only to bloom a few days later on Wednesday with higher temperatures. A few inches of tulip and hyacinth stems have pushed through the soil while the forsythia flowers are now bright yellow, all signs of spring. Some flowers "is" here!

In the Northern Hemisphere Spring is March, April, and May; and in the Southern it is September, October, and November. In some places it is marked by the position of the sun and stars in the sky, in the changes of migrational directions of wildlife, the budding of vegetation and the planting of crops. As Geoffrey Chaucer in his Canterbury Tales:

Whan that Aprille with his shoures soote,
The droghte of March hath perced to the roote,
And bathed every veyne in swich licóur
Of which vertú engendred is the flour;
Whan Zephirus eek with his swete breeth
Inspired hath in every holt and heeth
The tendre croppes, and the yonge sonne
Hath in the Ram his halfe cours y-ronne.

Christians have a unique perspective concerning Spring and some of the words used whose origins are lost in the history of languages no longer spoken but having evolved into the present day forms. I refer to the Resurrection of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Lent, according to one source, comes the late Old English or early Middle English verb for lengthen; the days start to become longer and soon the first fruits will arrive. Easter stems from the Dutch and German words Ost, or East where the day begins, or Norse from Eastru, a northern goddess for whom the month of April was called before Anglo-Saxon melded with Norman French.

For the moment we shall bide our time until we again experience the culmination of our waiting through the forty days of the Church's Lent!



### **Upcoming Commemorations**

### Benedict the African, confessor, died 1589 Monday, April 4, 2022

Born into slavery on the island of Sicily, Benedict lived as a hermit until the pope ordered all hermits to attach themselves to a monastery, at which time Benedict joined the Franciscans. Though illiterate, he was highly respected as a confessor and later superior of his community.

Albrecht Dürer, died 1528; Matthias Grünewald, died 1529; Lucas Cranach, died 1553; artists

#### Wednesday, April 6, 2022

These great artists revealed through their work the mystery of salvation and the wonder of creation. Dürer's work reflected the apocalyptic spirit of his time. Though he remained a Roman Catholic, he was sympathetic to Martin Luther's reforming work. Grünewald's paintings are known for their dramatic forms, vivid colors, and depiction of light. Cranach's work includes many fine religious examples and several portraits of Martin Luther. Cranach was also widely known for his woodcuts.

### Dietrich Bonhoeffer, theologian, died 1945 Saturday, April 9, 2022

Bonhoeffer was a German theologian who wrote profoundly, yet in an accessible manner. In the Second World War, he became a leader of the Confessing Church in Germany that resisted the Nazi movement. Linked to a plot to kill Hitler, he was hanged shortly before the end of the war.


