FREEDOM DAY

There has been a noticeable increase in Juneteenth celebrations across the United States over the past few years, following the killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, and the Black Lives Matter movement, and the latest racist massacre of 10 Black people at a supermarket in Buffalo.

Juneteenth is annual commemoration of the end of slavery in the United States after the Civil War, has been celebrated by African Americans since the late 1800s. President Biden signed legislation last year that made Juneteenth, which falls on June 19, a federal holiday.

There is tension in the holiday itself - celebrating the joyful emancipation of Black Americans from slavery while Black and Brown Americans today continue to experience horrific racism. There is also tension when you place this holiday alongside the next major federal holiday of July 4th, Independence Day.

"Juneteenth helps us understand the history of this country in more honest ways than July 4th ever has... Juneteenth, in contrast, offers a more honest view of the struggle for genuine freedom in the United States, which has often been delayed and denied to black people (and for our indigenous siblings.) Drew G. I. Hart, a theology professor at Messiah College and author of Trouble I've Seen and Who Will Be A Witness?

We commemorated the lives of the Emmanuel Nine this week gunned down in a racially motivated massacre in their own church - by a young white supremacist, who just happened to be Lutheran. The church has to pay attention with our whole heart to what's going on here, especially in the whitest denomination in America, the ELCA. This Sunday, not only will we prayerfully give thanks for the fathers among us, but we will remember our black and brown siblings, the joy they celebrate and struggles they face daily. ~

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Change of Seasons

We are all aware of the seasons, Summer, Fall, Winter, Spring; poets have written odes to them, musicians written concertos and oratorios about them, nature writers have expounded to no end. Shortly the summer solstice will occur, the longest day of the year, the first day of Summer!

The Church too has its seasons, some even celebrated in ancient times by the Hebrews before Christianity but forming the bases for what we do today. Now, with a stretch of the imagination, let us consider the Church Year. The first six months, roughly December through May, are packed with most of the significant events the Church celebrates: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, The Transfiguration, Lent, The Passion, Easter, Pentecost, and Trinity Sunday.

The Church is entering what is known as the Ordinary Times, and as it sounds, it is a time when not much of significance takes place except when a few Commemorations or Saints' days happen to fall on a Sunday and are celebrated with appropriate liturgical colors and lessons. It seems that all of the important events of the Church have happened, now it will be one boring liturgically Green Sunday after another. "Now the green blade rises...Love is come again like wheat arising green!"

Now is the time of the Church, the Holy gave us our orders on Pentecost and much work needs to be done. I always enjoyed the column that Colin McNickle wrote in the Tribune Review on Saturday because during the summer it was about his garden and how it was growing. Gardening is hard work, tilling the soil, watering, fertilizing, cutting away dead growth, and worse, pulling weeds.

The Bible if full of images of seeds, trees, roots, vines, and branches. CLC is our orchard, our vineyard, our garden; we have our work to do in order to cultivate it and have it bear fruit in season. We are in Millvale to stay, not just to grow at 917 Evergreen, but to broadcast seed, cultivate new fields, nurture that which is already growing. We have an expert gardening consultant to rely on, The Holy Spirit! ~

What is Your Name?

There is in Cairo an eerie, demonic site, terrifying to the human soul. Far into the chaos and noise of the city that never slumbers, there is another city—"the city of the dead." A vast tangle of tombs and mausoleums that, through the windows of tour buses, remains grim, distant, and quiet is, at close encounter, not a place of repose at all. It is a wretched, loud, busy, suffering place lived in by Cairo's least and lowliest.

But there is no need to travel to Egypt to see the grim scene. Cities of the dead are all around us, if we care to look places where the condemned, dirtied, ridiculed, blamed, and broken spend their demonized days living as if dead in cells and wards, beneath plastic and cardboard, in rust and garbage, among decay and rot, forgotten and lonely. There, beyond our windows, so used to their own condemned life, the most they hope for is to be left alone. "I beg you, do not torment me" (Luke 8:28). "I beg you." The gospel says "beg"!

He'd had enough—the man could endure no more judgment, no more religious platitudes, no more being the topic of conversation, no more shame, no more chains and shackles. It was—it is—bad enough to be plagued by demons in the cities of the dead, so please, no more torment! I beg you.

"What is your name?" (v. 30). Those four beautiful words stun the ugliness on the hillside. "What is your name?" In that question there thunders a spoken truth: the desire to know, not ignore; to approach, not pass by; to dare, not cower.

"And they were afraid" (v. 35). Those four riddling words confuse the swinish hillside. In that spoken truth there is exposed a question: Afraid of what? Of knowing the banished one? Of approaching the wild one? Of daring to welcome the troubled one home?

What is your name? Legion? No: Child of God. ~

Upcoming Commemorations

Onesimos Nesib, translator, evangelist, died 1931

Tuesday, June 21, 2022

Onesimos was born in Ethiopia. Captured, enslaved, and taken to Eritrea, he was there freed by Swedish missionaries. He translated the Bible into his native Oromo and returned to preach there.

John the Baptist

Friday, June 24, 2022

John said, "[Jesus] must increase, but I must decrease." And so his birth is celebrated half a year before Jesus', just as the daylight in the northern hemisphere begins to wane. Jesus honored John as being the greatest prophet.

Presentation of the Augsburg Confession, 1530 Saturday, June 25, 2022

On this day in 1530 the German and Latin editions of the Augsburg Confession were presented to the Emperor Charles of the Holy Roman Empire. The Augsburg Confession was written by Philipp Melanchthon and endorsed by Martin Luther, and consists of a brief summary of points in which the reformers saw their teaching as either agreeing with or differing from that of the Roman Catholic Church of the time.

Philipp Melanchthon, renewer of the church, died 1560 Saturday, June 25, 2022

Though he died on April 19, Philipp Melanchthon is commemorated today because of his connection with the Augsburg Confession. Colleague and co-reformer with Martin Luther, Melanchthon was a brilliant scholar, known as "the teacher of Germany."

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
