Joseph Imhoff, Installment 2

The Shamerim regarded themselves as the guardians of the Law, the Torah, they were descendants of Manasseh and Ephraim, sons of Joseph, and from the Levites who were charged with religious duties.

The people of Israel pestered God through Samuel to give them a king to rule them like the other nations had instead of the Judges such as Deborah, Gideon, Jephthah, Samson and others. All the tribes were united under Saul, David and Solomon. Upon Solomon's death his son, Rehoboam, became king that lead to a revolt by the ten northern tribes under Jeroboam dividing the kingdom into Judah to the south with Jerusalem as its capitol and Israel in the north where Samaria became the capitol where the distinct version of faith held sway.

Distinct means the people had a dialect known as Samaritan Hebrew and the writing also developed differing characters, some taken from older Hebrew. Israel was the first kingdom to fall to the Assyrians who according to their accounts transported people from all over the empire to break up cohesive population, thus there would have been some intermarriage. Closer reading of Chronicles and Jeremiah indicate the faithful may have headed south because the tribes of the North are noted for having supported the restoration of the Temple under Josiah thereby preserving Hebrew lineage.

Throughout time a faithful remnant in the faith has remained, so were the woman of Sychar and the the Good Samaritan among those who had remained faithful, did Jesus know this when he talked to the woman by the well and purposely use it in his parable?

They remain to this day calling themselves Children of Israel and not Jews, the Rabbinic authority of Israel considers them a sect of Judaism and have legal status as such except when their practices differ. It's a 'they are but they aren't' situation. There are 6,000 differences in the Pentateuch preserved by each faction, and variations in other writings, some corroborated by ancient outside sources. As of 2022, with ever dwindling numbers, their population stands at about 1,000 persons divided among several towns and some known to be in Sicily from the diaspora and closer to our time in Brazil.

And we think and worry about congregations closing within nearly all denominations Christianity! $\,^\sim$



Intentional Attention

We set the table just so. We light fresh taper candles. We mop the floor and put out the best china. We carefully attend to the recipe, being sure to exclude any allergens and to include tons of home-cooked flavor.

Many of us have been taught how to be hospitable to guests in our home. In fact, there's a whole industry dedicated to hospitality and making others feel welcome in new places!

But today we are reminded that hospitality is not just a matter of attention to detail, but of attention to the individual guests too.

Though this text is often used to pit Mary and Martha against one another in the hearts of hearers (with Mary often winning that contest), perhaps it is less about either/or and more a both/and situation.

Jesus is on the scene, and Martha is so busy trying to make him feel welcome that she neglects to pay attention to him. Certainly, he is the focus of her work (she wants the place ready for him!), but when it comes to Jesus, his words are at a premium, and Mary devotes her attention to making him feel welcome by making him feel heard.

Martha is not wrong in her desire to create the right environment. Her intention is right. Being welcoming is serious business and takes time and effort (and she could probably use her sister's help to get the work done!). But what good is a clean house and a good meal at the expense of the guests being seen, heard, and truly known?

For heavenly hospitality in homes, churches, and communities, it is not enough to set the table and invite the guests. They must be listened to, heard, and given attention. Both intention and attention must be considered for true hospitality to be shown. In Jesus, God shows humanity both. ~

Upcoming Commemorations

Bartolomé de Las Casas, missionary to the Indies, died 1566 Sunday, July 17, 2022

A native of Spain, Las Casas first came to the Western hemisphere while serving in the military. Upon arriving in the West, Las Casas was granted a large estate with Indigenous enslaved people whom he freed after he was ordained a priest. He worked in the Caribbean and Central America to improve the lives of the native peoples.

Mary Magdalene, Apostle Friday, July 22, 2022

Sometimes called "the apostle to the apostles" because she told them of her encounter with the risen Lord, Mary was a woman of Galilee who followed Jesus throughout his ministry. She was present at Jesus' crucifixion and his burial.

Birgitta of Sweden, renewer of the church, died 1373 Saturday, July 23, 2022

Birgitta married at age thirteen and had four daughters. Widowed at age thirty-eight, she gave all that she owned to the poor, and founded a community of monks and nuns led by a woman. Her work is continued today by the Society of St. Birgitta.


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
