





Joseph Imhoff

This past week on Thursday, July 28, the Church celebrated the Commemoration of three of three musicians, composers, who contributed much of what has become staples of church music. All three were born Germans but their influence has spread far beyond that loose confederation of individual small states and Europe, also beyond the realm of the church into the world, into time and history!

The first and least known is Heinrich Schütz who was born in 1785, was discovered singing by the landgraf, count, became a choirboy, studied law, went to Venice and studied music with Giovanni Gabrieli, bringing many new musical ideas with him and influencing German music through his dozens of pupils. Eventually he came into the service of the Elector of Saxony in Dresden where he died in 1762. Of his output much of it was for the Lutheran Church. While singing with the Pittsburgh Lutheran Chorus we did his intricate "Cantate Domino" and very moving "Woman, why weepest thou", the encounter of Mary Magdalene with Jesus after the Resurrection. Hardly any of his organ or secular works exist, yet he was the forerunner of the two to come after him.

Johann Sebastian Bach needs no introduction, I guess I just did. Born in 1685, one hundred years after Schütz, thirteen years after his death. He is a giant in the music world because he transcends genres, styles and forms, he made them his own like nobody else. It's easier to list the types of music he didn't write: opera is the only one I can think of. For the Churches, Lutheran, he wrote cantatas for every Sunday in a five year cycle, motets, anthems, organ and instrumental pieces galore, all this while teaching, directing choirs and composing non-sacred music for a variety of secular occasions until he died in 1750.

Third on the list for commemorating is George Frederick Handel who was born in the same year as Bach, 1685. For a time he held a position similar to Bach's as kapellmeister responsible for preparing music for church services in Hallé, but his fame came elsewhere, in opera and in England when a former patron became King George I. Besides opera he provided music for special royal events such as fireworks and great barges on the Thames. English oratorios was a part of his output he developed and was its greatest proponent, some on Biblical subjects, 'Saul', 'Israel in Egypt', 'Deborah', but as the popularity of opera as being only for the rich faded he made this his focus and produced the best know one ever composed, 'Messiah''! Other Biblical stories were, 'Samson', 'Joseph and his Brethren', 'Belshazzar', 'Joshua' and 'Samson'. Due to an accident he started to go blind and poor treatment made it worse until he was blind by 1752, and would die in 1759, the last performance he heard was 'Messiah'.

If Bach was the greatest theologian in music Handel was its greatest story teller! $\,^\sim$



The Richness of Life

Many people in the United States have such an abundance of possessions that they don't even notice it. It feels normal to have things in excess. For others in the same culture, paying rent or the mortgage and having enough to buy food is a struggle. Scarcity is a daily reality.

Someone in the crowd asked Jesus, "Tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me" (Luke 12:13). It feels urgent. Is he being impatient? Is his brother refusing to give him a fair share of the estate? Is he being greedy? Is he desperate because he is unable to pay his debts or care for his children?

We don't know who is living in abundance of possessions and who is living in scarcity in this story. Whether we are rich or poor, greedy or needy, we can fall into the trap of thinking that an abundance of possessions is what life must be about. Having enough to live and be safe is important for everyone. But having as much as possible while others go without is outside of God's good intentions for human community.

Jesus points beyond abundance of possessions to finding the key to life in an abundance of something else: being "rich toward God" (v. 21). What could this mean? First, it means knowing that God provides abundantly for us and for all, so we live with gratitude to God for all we have. Second, it means knowing our only true security is in God's love and grace, which we always have. Third, it means responding to the God of abundance with the same generosity toward others. Being rich toward God means being generous toward our neighbors.

Why is this the key to life, and not abundance of possessions? Because we are created to live in relationship with God and each other. And in living generously toward each other we participate in the goodness of God. That is the richness of life. ~



Upcoming Commemorations

Dominic, founder of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), died 1221 Monday, August 8, 2022

Dominic was a Spanish priest who saw the wealth of the clergy as a stumbling block for the church, so he formed a movement, the Order of Preachers (commonly called Dominicans) devoted to itinerant preaching and living in poverty.


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
