

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God's Great Owl

(January)

An odd title you might think but it is the title of a chapter in Joseph Wood Krutch (1893-1970) 1949 book the Twelve Seasons * A Perpetual Calendar for the Country. Having had the book for a long time, perhaps from college, I thought it might be a good starting point for my article the first Sunday of each month. J W Krutch, author, critic and naturalist, was an esteemed professor of English from 1938 to 1952 at Columbia University when advised by his doctors he moved to Tucson Arizona for health reasons.

He writes his first essay near the end of January, the snow so eagerly awaited in December had held off until the Winter Solstice and fallen just before Christmas. "The snow, then has been with us long enough so that it is now no novelty, but one of the conditions of life. When it first fell it was exciting almost as the first flowers of spring. Even my cats, I noticed, took it as gaily as children and dogs commonly do." Causing him to wonder if the animals have the same concepts of this as people do.

Out in the New England winter he continues to take his walk, the cats accompanying him where he observes, "...winter has turned the landscape into a kind of cold desert... The earth has been drastically simplified, and sweeping space is perhaps the most successful of its effects."

Winter for human beings is the time for festivities, the 'holidays' falling in the middle, a Christmas tree substituting for the beauty of the outdoors, the contrasts between inside and out as we travel from place to place with celebration.

One evening around eight P.M., "Suddenly I was alone with the universe. The realist things besides myself in all existence were not either human beings nor any living things. I seemed about to grasp what the earth, the suns, and the stars meant to themselves as distinguished from what they mean to any of us creatures...."

There is the lonely hoot of a great owl in the distance and he is returned to reality. The meaning is clear to him, the owl is foraging for food, the hoot is to startle the prey, mice most likely, into moving so it can swoop down and catch his dinner.

"In an instant I was back among my own kind. The communication from space was never received. Sometimes I wonder whether God, the only time He ever began to speak to me, was interrupted by one of His own owls." $\,\sim\,$



Name of Jesus Chosen Families

When the shepherds arrived, they came upon a scene not unlike that in many nativity sets: Mary and Joseph, gazing adoringly (and sleepily, no doubt!) at the manger between them. This holy family, at once biological and chosen, encourages us to think with compassion and divine creativity about our own definitions of family and belonging.

Jesus, in both his name and his very being, was known and loved well before his conception, birth, or ritual entry into the community. This heir of God and adopted son was known and loved deeply and given a mission and purpose in the world.

We also, as heirs of God's mysteries, and as adopted children, are named, commissioned, and blessed, not because of our lineage, our ancestry, or our family affiliation, but because God is love. Through the infant Christ, we can see and know ourselves to be part of the family of God for which we and all people have been chosen.

This and all holiday seasons carry many cultural expectations and assumptions about families and family gatherings. How can our communities of faith, in this season and beyond, take special care to notice, include, and be transformed by the gifts of those who are single; those who are childless by choice or circumstance; those who are separated, divorced, or widowed; multigenerational households; same-gender couples and families; those who find family in places of congregate living; those who find kinship with communities of grief, recovery, or shared interest? How can we recognize and care for those in our communities who need to be embraced, included, seen, and loved for who God created them to be?

May the nontraditional nature of the holy family help us recognize familial love in all relationships where belonging is fostered, trust is built, encouragement is given, and joys and griefs alike are shared. May we see ourselves and all God's children as kin and kindred: one body, with its many diverse and beautiful members. ~

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
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
