Submit an anonymous question in the offering plate, and you might get your question answered in the Weekly Update! Have a Bible question? A Church question? A burning query about what the number of candles means and why? Ask away!

You asked, I'll answer!

Question: "Some people have said that taking the Lord's name in vain means saying "Oh my God" while other people say it's using your faith to justify doing terrible things like extortion. What does the bible actually mean by this in context?"

Answer: That's a really great question, and I think you are onto something in your discernment of the second commandment. Here's Martin Luther's explanation of the Second Commandment for reference:

You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, practice witchcraft, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks.

This commandment comes from the Hebrew Bible, and the giving of the Law to Moses. As some helpful background, many observant conservative Jews do not speak God's name aloud, (YHWH, or Yahweh) instead replacing it with another name, like Adonai (Lord) Some even go so far as to write G_d, rather than spell it out. But this commandment also has to do with actions; claiming to be the people of God, using God's name, but living a life contrary to the commandments and God's will. The whole story of the prophets of the Hebrew Bible warns the people of exactly these things: using God's name to justify actions which do not give life, care for the least of these, and diminish our role in caring for all of God's good creation.

Long story short, I think it's both, but unfortunately for us, it's a lot easier to police kids saying "OMG" than it is to talk with them about how their actions reflect their Creator and Redeemer. *continued*

There is also a difference between swearing with God's name and profanity. Profanity are words that are agreed upon to be offensive by some, but this "agreement" depends on such a variety of factors, language, culture, family, personal preferences, etc. On the other hand, using God's name "in vain" invokes God's power in a way that God did not intend, for frivality or damnation. Using profanity may harm our neighbor, which is sin, and may be atoned for, but I believe God is far more concerned with our actions than our four letter words.

Admittedly, I struggle with my language, and having a kid has been a wake up call to check my speech. My split -second reactions to stubbing my toe now require explanation and apology. When I do have those OMG moments, I try to immediately reflect on what I intended to do with God's name. Usually it is actually a plea for help in my frustration. We run into dangerous territory when we presume to apply God's name to our agendas, likes or dislikes.



Are You New Here?

"You know the way to the place where I am going," Jesus tells his followers (John 14:4), but they aren't so sure. So he goes on, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" (John 14:6), but they're still confused. Finally, he asks, "Have I been with you all this time . . . and you still do not know me?" (John 14:9). It's as if he's asking them, "Are you new here?"

They've had him all this time. They've watched him and listened to him and learned from him. But, suddenly faced with the idea that he won't always be there in quite the same way, it's as if they remember nothing.

Yet, Jesus isn't one of those teachers who says, "Do as I say, not as I do." He lived his very life here on earth as a model for us, even now. Our road map to the place where he is going is to understand his words and actions, not only as his way, truth, and life, but as our own as well.

It's as complicated as that, but it's also that simple. "Do not let your hearts be troubled" (John 14:1), Jesus tells them. Indeed, road maps are meant to reassure us, by giving us direction and setting us on the right course.

He didn't say it would be easy. He also didn't tell this to any of them alone, and his words are intended for us to hear in community today as well. Living out our understandings of Jesus as the way, truth, and life is a collective act, not an individual one. We do this every time we gather in community, whether that's a congregation, a parent-teacher organization, an extended family, or a neighborhood Buy Nothing group.

"You know the way to the place where I am going," Jesus tells us. We might feel new here, but it turns out we've had the road map all along. ~



Upcoming Commemorations

Julian of Norwich, renewer of the church, died around 1416

Monday, May 8, 2023

When she was about thirty years old, Julian (or Juliana) reported visions that she later compiled into a book, Sixteen Revelations of Divine Love, now a classic of medieval mysticism. The visions declared that love was the meaning of religious experience, provided by Christ who is love, for the purpose of love.



Victor the Moor, martyr, died 303 (TFF) Monday, May 8, 2023

Also known as Victor Maurus, this native of the northwest African nation of Mauritania was a soldier in the Roman Praetorian Guard. Under the persecution of Maximian, Victor died for his faith at Milan.





Nicolaus Ludwig von Zinzendorf, renewer of the church, hymnwriter, died 1760 Tuesday, May 9, 2023

When he was 22, a group of Moravians asked permission to live on Zinzendorf's land. He agreed, and eventually worldwide Moravian missions emanated from this community. Zinzendorf participated in these mis-

sions, and is also remembered for writing hymns characteristic of his Pietistic faith.
