We also receive a food truck once a month on the second Monday of the month from 412 Food Rescue and can always use help unloading.


The Food Pantry is Open Mondays and Fridays from 9:30am to 11:30am, and on Wednesdays from 5pm to 7pm.

# Wrapping Up

The four parts of the service: **Gathering**, **Word**, **Meal**, **Sending**, **have all come together into a seamless entity**, though not always known by the same names or in the same order they have remained fairly consistent since Martin Luther's Deutsche Messe of 1526 based the Latin Mass in use at the time. Latin can be a very beautiful sounding language but in his day as in ours it was not spoken by ordinary people. Even in countries of the former Roman Empire Portuguese, Spanish, French, Italian, Romanian, and others had substantially diverged from the original; German wasn't even close!

'Volk Spreche', language of the people was introduced by him and as they immigrated to the new world the Lutheran Church went with them in German, Swedish, Danish, Norwegian, even English. America was becoming an English speaking country and by 1748 Henry Melchior Muhlenberg of the Pennsylvania Ministerium used the German model as a foundation for an American Liturgy.

By 1878 the three main Lutheran bodies in the United States decided to prepare a **Common Service Book** for English speaking congregations retaining the traditions of Lutheran worship which was published in 1888. Hymns were not included but a committee of the three bodies worked on a complete book with the occasional services and a hymnal released in 1917 as Common Service Book with Hymnal. One may note, the music for the hymns was printed first with the words separate below unlike our modern hymnals.

As times change, languages change, some words just go out of fashion, some meanings change, what once was clear sounds foreign, even for a Church of every time and every place! King James' English may sound elegant but contemporary worshipers may no longer understand all its nuances.

In 1958 the Service Book and Hymnal was published updating language and revising practices in line with studies of liturgical practices. Then in 1978 the **Lutheran Book of Worship** came out which allowed for participation by more persons during the service besides the Pastor, lay readers, Communion assistants, many practices once common but lost over the years were reinstated to great affect. Much reflective of Lutheran commonality with other denominations.

The up-to-date **Evangelical Lutheran Worship** of 2006 expands what has gone before with a variety of musical settings, we are now using Setting Nine, while recognizing the diversity of Lutherans beyond the Church's German roots. Being the Church in a modern ever faster changing World is difficult and hard work. No doubt we will see a new 'contemporary' book in the future, possibly virtual instead of printed, around 2039. ~



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**"You are what you eat."** This phrase is frequently used in American culture to encourage young children to eat nutritious food and, yes, is often met with exasperated sighs on the part of such children. Despite the phrase having become cliché, a surprising amount of scientific truth accompanies it.

When we consume food, it travels through the esophagus and into the stomach and small intestine, where it combines with fluids and breaks down into nutrients. These usable nutrients pass into our bloodstream and to the rest of our body. Thus, the process of eating and drinking literally turns your food into part of your body. So truly, "You are what you eat."

This week's gospel continues Jesus' long teaching that he is the true bread from heaven: "Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty," we heard last week (John 6:35). Today he gets more graphic: "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life"-no wonder those gathered around him get upset! The Gospel of John doesn't include the institution of the Lord's supper; indeed, in John, Jesus himself is the Passover lamb, slain at the cross. But here, thirteen chapters earlier, Jesus declares that accepting the invitation to come to and believe in him—to "eat [his] flesh and drink [his] blood" means life. When we take into ourselves Jesus' words, his healing touch, the power of his love, they become part of us. They nourish our spirits so we can live in wholeness, health, and salvation (words that are all connected in the ancient languages of scripture).

It is not surprising, then, that holy communion, the sharing of literal food and drink, became a profound means by which the church receives—and becomes—the body of Christ. In a mysterious way we can't fully understand, we truly are what we eat, and no other meal is more life-giving.

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#### **Upcoming Commemorations**



#### Bernard, Abbot of Clairvaux, died 1153 Tuesday, August 20, 2024

Bernard, a Cistercian monk, was a man of great spirituality who wrote mystical works and criticized those whom he thought took an overly intellectual approach to the faith. He became an abbot, and wrote several hymns that are still beloved today.



#### Bartholomew, Apostle Saturday, August 24, 2024

Mentioned as one of Jesus' disciples in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Bartholomew's name is replaced in John's gospel by Nathanael, leading many to believe that the two are different names for the same person. Little is known about his work, though some traditions place him later in India or Armenia.

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
