

A Final Thought

Language has always fascinated me, the sounds, the rhythms, even foreign languages that I never studied but have an affinity for because I like opera where you hear French, Italian, German, occasionally Spanish or Czech and even English! From writing these columns, once monthly but now weekly I often use the German from college for original Luther writings, the year of high school Latin with Mrs. Haas for church references plus throwing in a little Greek and Hebrew.

Which brings me to an oft repeated phrase, "They changed the words!" Be it a hymn, a prayer, or a scripture reading, words of one particular version that have been ingrained over years of usage. Words and usage in a language change, usually over time as a natural evolution of pronunciation and meaning, unlike today where words have acquired unintentional connotations and suddenly become unspeakable. This is most noticeable in the various editions of the hymnal used over the years in the Lutheran Church.

The Authorized Edition of the Bible in English known as the King James version is a landmark of literature stemming from the time and writings of the style of Shakespeare, but people no longer use many of the words in the same way, some not at all, and scholarship has revised how some words are translated from the original sources. If one memorized Bible quotes years ago they sound foreign to modern ears. Two items remain inviolate from 1611, The Lord's Prayer and Psalm Twenty-Three!

The liturgy and hymns are a different story, we now use the fourth book of worship and hymns since 1917, a little over 100 years. Over the years the 'thee's', 'thy's',






'thine's', have been replaced by 'you's'. Words and phrases have been modernized with the common usage of today not 1917! In one way our congregation has an advantage, instead of looking down at the page of a book we look up to the screens on the walls of the nave, it is good to read the words we say rather than reciting them by rote. I find it helpful to read the liturgy lest I slip into the words from the SBH of 1958 or LBW of 1978 (still, it happens every once in a while!).

I was reminded how Dancing With The Stars had a Grease night using music from the soundtrack for the dances and atmosphere. The comparison of Rydell High School in 1958 to Shaler Area today would be close to the Service Book and Hymnal of 1958 to the new Evangelical Lutheran Worship we use today. Even things that are the same have changed in many ways! ~

What Would Jesus Do?

At the outset, rules seem simple. They divide the world into good and bad and help us restore a measure of order to a chaotic world. Unfortunately, the same rules that we use to bring order out of chaos are often insufficient to deal with the complexity of our lives, which is one of the reasons there truly is an exception to every rule. This is also the reason we appoint judges: to interpret the law when it fails to adequately address the circumstance to which it is applied.

In Jesus' day the Pharisees and scribes were known for their strict observance of the law. So when they notice the disciples of Jesus eating with defiled hands, the Pharisees and scribes bring this perceived breach of the law to Jesus' attention. The law itself, which requires that people wash their hands before eating, originated from ancient purity laws. Jesus understands this and simultaneously upholds and reframes the law by drawing his listeners' attention away from the washing of hands to what truly defiles. In doing so, Jesus acts as a judge and offers an interpretation of the law that both upholds its original intent of purity and absolves the disciples of wrongdoing. At the same time, he exposes the prioritization of human precepts over God's command and reminds us of God's sovereignty and compassion.

Rules are simple, but our world is not. Through the incarnation, the Word made flesh, God meets us at the intersection of law and life. In Jesus, God the judge enters our world in a new way and interprets the law. And through Jesus, we come to understand God's will in a messy world. Therefore, if we as Christians truly want to live out the will of God, we do well to start with that old and simple question "What would Jesus do?" ~

Nikolai Frederik Severin Grundtvig, bishop, renewer of the church, died 1872 Monday, September 2, 2024

Grundtvig was, with Søren Kierkegaard, one of the two great Danish theologians of the nineteenth century. As a pastor, he battled the prevalent idea that Christianity was more a philosophy than divine revelation. He wrote over a thousand hymns.
